The Vernon Township Fire Protection Territory Board

The Vernon Township Fire Protection Territory was formed July 1, 2020. The Territory is in the northwest corner of Hancock County, Indiana. Vernon Township Fire Department (VTFD) protects the citizens of the Town of Fortville, the Town of McCordsville and the unincorporated rural area of Vernon Township. The Territory Board is made up of the Vernon Township Trustee, and a member of the McCordsville and Fortville Town Councils. The fire chief serves as an Ex-Officio member of the board.



Finance, Administration & Human Resources

2023 was a year of tremendous growth for Vernon Township Fire Department. We hired 11 new people: 10 full-time operations personnel and a Director of Support Services to assist both the Fire Department and the Township with building and grounds maintenance. In the 1st quarter of 2023, we hired five of our part time personnel as career firefighters. We had four resignations in 2023 but we were fortunate to hire Firefighter/Paramedics with prior experience. Our average length of full-time service is 15 months as the department has only recently started career hires.

Richard Hiser was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant. As a Lieutenant, Hiser has additional responsibilities with the EMS Division. Stacy Nielsen was appointed Director of Administration.



We are placing an emphasis on streamlining our HR processes including payroll, onboarding/offboarding, performance management and compliance. Beginning in January of 2024 we are employing Paycor as our human resource management platform. We brought on additional online compliance training that was completed by all employees.

Facilities and Apparatus

Facilities

In 2023 Vernon Township moved into its new station in McCordsville. This station was designed for career personnel who will operate from this station twenty-four hours a day. The station was designed by DELV Design and constructed by **Garmong Construction Services.** Several members of the fire department served on the design committee to make sure this station would meet the needs of the department and community. The station was designed with firefighter health and safety as a top priority. The construction was completed in August of 2023 and was delivered under budget.






Apparatus

A new ambulance build design was completed in 2022, our EMS Chief has been working with the vendor and closely monitoring its progress. This new addition to our fleet should be in service in June of 2024. Vernon **Township Fire Department also** purchased Sugar Creek Township Fire Department's retired ambulance. With this purchase VTFD was able to place an ambulance that was equipped with an automatic patient loading system at Station 432 in McCordsville. Once the new ambulance is delivered, this unit will become a reserve apparatus for use when our primary pieces are out of service for maintenance.



Incident Response

The number of incidents has increased annually since becoming a fire territory, 2023 was no different. Vernon Township Fire Department responded to 1681 call for service which is a record high. Of those calls the largest percentage was for Rescue and Emergency Medical Services.







Incident Responses by Unit

Response Times

Vernon Township Fire Department operates from two stations. Station 431 is in Fortville; Station 432 is in McCordsville. Personnel are on duty 24 hours per day, 7 days per week ready to respond immediately to any call for assistance. Our average turnout time is one minute and 14 seconds. Our average travel time is four minutes and fifty-four seconds. Our average total response time is six minutes and eight seconds.



Turnout Time

Turnout time measures the time elapsed from when the emergency dispatcher informs the fire unit of an emergency and when the unit leaves the fire station.


Travel Time

Emergency Medical Services


2023 was a big year for growth in the EMS division. We went from having one paramedic on duty a day in 2020, to two to three in 2023. This is a tremendous success as other departments are struggling to acquire and retain paramedics. We became a paramedic precepting site for IU Health Lifeline. This enabled us to send a member of Vernon Township to the 2023 class at no cost to the agency, and subsequent paramedic licensure to an employee. More schools have reached out to us to become precepting sites. This not only gives us the opportunity to teach, but also lets students see the atmosphere that they may want to get involved with. A controlled substance license was acquired through the state and federal authorities.

After implementing the LUCAS devices on cardiac arrests, we have seen a significant increase in return of spontaneous circulation (ROSC) on scene. Four groups were given CPR save awards in 2023 for having a patient return home in a neurological normal state. Our ROSC rate for 2023 was 54%. Several CPR classes were completed for staff and civilians. Eighty CPR cards were issued with forty additional individuals taught hands only CPR. The department was able to purchase additional devices in 2023 from a grant and sound financial practices.



LUCAS DEVICE

- Staffing increased from one to three paramedics on shift daily.
- Obtained controlled substance licensing from the state and federal government.
- Ballistic vests and helmets purchased and placed on apparatus.
- Active participant in county wide Critical Incident Stress Management team.
- LUCAS at both stations.
- Purchased a used ambulance from another agency that was newer and in better condition to replace current Medic 432. This will become a reserve unit once the new truck arrives in 2024.
- Paramedic precepting site for IU Health. More schools are reaching out to utilize VTFD for student ride outs.
- One student graduated from medic school in December.
- Drug screens/medical screens set up with private vendor.
- CPR training was provided for department personnel and police departments.
- EMS Vending machines placed in each station for inventory control.
- Medic 432 in service as primary apparatus



Training

Vernon Township firefighters had a busy year of training in 2023. We had a total of 7401 hours of training with 5984 hours of fire related training and 1417 hours of EMS training. During the year we formed a great relationship with Greenfield Fire and Buck Creek Fire and began joint live fire training at Greenfield's training facility. This is the first live fire training we have been able to perform since becoming a full-time department.


This year we had the opportunity to train in an acquired house that the town of McCordsville allowed us to use before it was demolished. We were also able to practice standpipe operations at the Madison Loft Apartments while they were under construction.

Our officers completed the Safety Officer and Fire Officer 2 courses during the year. 12 firefighters completed the FOST class (Fire Officer Strategy and Tactics) that Lt. Campi led. We also created a ride out officer task book which will prepare our firefighters to fill the officer role when the normal officer is off.

Vernon Township Fire Department also provided a fire engine and crew to assist at FDIC (Fire Department Instructors Conference) in 2023. This was a great experience for our firefighters as they were able to observe and participate in hands-on training provided by instructors from multiple departments.

I would like to thank all our firefighters for their dedication and hard work throughout the year.

Public Education and PR

VTFD had 34 Public Education and Public Relation events for 2023 which is a 62% increase from 2022. We continue to grow and foster community relationships with the schools, preschools, and other organizations throughout the township. With station tours, school visits, and participation in community events, we continue to get more requests to participate in community events.

Our social media reached 109,983 people on Facebook in 2023 which is a 10% increase, while we reached 697 people on Instagram which is a 126% increase. We gained 567 new Facebook followers in 2023 and 55 new followers on Instagram. Our most popular social media posts are about community involvement, incidents, promotions, awards, and job postings.

IT and Equipment

In 2023 VTFD purchased iPads for the front-line apparatus and staff vehicles to be used as mobile data terminals. These iPads are used for daily interactions with ESO for reports, as well as our mobile CAD (which was also purchased in 2023) enabling units to mark enroute to an incident, on scene, and back in service. Using these devices has given us more accurate run time information; they have also eliminated the need to utilize the radios to mark enroute or on scene which keeps the radio channel clear for other communications with dispatch.

During the summer we purchased all new KNOX equipment from the KNOX company including

- Key Secure devices to secure KNOX Keys in the apparatus and staff vehicles.
- eKey's, a new locking mechanism that can track who accesses a KNOX Box and allows for mutual aid access into other departments' KNOX Boxes when needed.
- New MedVaults to secure our narcotic medications in.
- New Station Vaults to secure expired medications in.

All these new KNOX devices are monitored through a cloud account that provides information on when a device is accessed,





Inspections, Investigations, and Plan Reviews

VTFD conducted 230 inspections in 2023, a 49% increase from last year. Inspections in occupied businesses on Main Street in Fortville have been completed and are progressing towards McCordsville. A total of 934 violations were discovered. Most business owners have been very receptive to inspections and the program being established. Development of a county wide fire ordinance to enhance inspections continues with coordination and cooperation between VTFD, Greenfield, Buck Creek, and Sugar Creek as well as the county.

There was a total of 5 fire investigations conducted in 2023. Investigations are conducted by either the Fire Marshal or Fire Chief. Three on shift personnel were certified as investigators in 2023, and a plan will be developed to train them and begin to utilize them in the future.

There were 65 new construction plan reviews conducted in 2023. The working relationship between both towns' building departments and the county continues with coordinating joint inspections and consulting each other during plan reviews.

Pre-Plans

This year shift crews performed pre-plans for the first time ever on 247 businesses in our area. Preplans help us in the event of an emergency incident by collecting emergency contact information for businesses, identify the location of items that would be essential during emergency operations such as exits, utility meters, and fire protection equipment locations. Having the crews conduct the preplans is vital as it gets the front-line personnel out into the buildings so that they can become familiar with them and know their way around better.

- Preplans for local business are being completed by shift personnel.
- iPAD for Mobile Data Tablets installed in apparatus.
- iPhones for staff instead of using personal phones for department business.
- KNOX devices (e-key). This system will phase out the current mechanical key lock being used.
- Increase in public education/public relation events.
- Main Street businesses inspected.
- Established working relationships with local building inspectors.
- Participation on committee for county wide fire prevention ordinance
- Social Media presence increased.
- Increase in inspections.
- Participated in Shop with Public Safety with both police departments.

The VTFD thanks all the members of the Fire Corps, who in 2023, donated 445 hours of time through twenty-one incident responses, and several public relation events.
