WWTP Expansion Bond and Updates

• Bond Ordinance

• Sewer Rate Ordinance

- Deen Rogers from Baker Tilly stated Aqua Indiana was added to the rate comparison graph on page 4. The Council may adopt a rate lower than advertised but not higher.
 Mr. Rogers discussed page 16 pointing out three different proposed rates. Mr. Rogers recommended Alternative #2 at \$52.99 for monthly sewer rate. The proposed rate is in the Rate Ordinance to be introduced.

Noise Ordinance Amendment Draft

- Ms. Galbraith stated this would be a permit for an exceedance for the 64/66 decibels. This would be 90 decibels at the source.
- Mark Helle, resident, stated we do not have enough data to know if this is going to work. Why
 change the numbers if we don't know if they are right? Why are we changing it to the source?
 What happens if it is 90 at the source and over 66 at the line. It is too late to go to midnight.
- Bob Holzbach, resident, has a few questions. How does this improve the health, safety welfare of the residents? How was 90 reached? What is the definition of source, open to interpretation? How were the hours decided to be appropriate? It states 30 days to review the application, what are the criteria to approve or deny the permit? It says person applying will notify the residents by available means, which residents will be notified, what is available means, and how much notice will be given? Police may enter private party, when will this happen, randomly, when they apply for permit or by customer complaints? What are the penalties if they exceed the 90 decibels? Will you allow for community comment on the permit application? It talks about fees, what fees are we talking about? Police may shut down event, may is an ambiguous term. Should they automatically shut it down if they don't comply? Who has the authority? The officer at the scene? What are the criteria to shut down the event? I personally disagree with the amendment as written.
- Leah Borrmann, resident, my opinion this special permit is solely for the winery although some businesses in Town may take advantage of it. I don't think any business is going to have 10 events. In October there was a sound test request by the homeowners east of the winery and through the grapevine the homeowners did not want to sign off on the 74 decibels at the source. I can't find it the minutes. Who decided it was needed? Why was it decided it was needed? Who decided the sound should be 90 at the source? Why was the noise committee involved with these changes? It states the Town will allow 10 events per address, is the per week, per month, or per year? Normal residents will not have 10 parties a year. I want to know if every permit will be approved if the \$50 fee is paid. I would like to know if the winery does apply for this permit and exceeds the limits, will they have to pay the fines this time or will they be waived again? I thought this was put to bed but 90 decibels is too loud, 74 decibels is too



loud, midnight is too late but who am I? I'm just a resident who is very resentful my time has been wasted and the Council has already made a decision. If and when we sell our home, it is going to be a problem when we hear things about the winery and their special events. I'm disappointed even mentioning about selling our home, but if this permit stands with its ambiguity, we will have no choice but to move.

- John Price, resident, stated he has similar comments as Mrs. Borrmann, Is the per address a year, a day? 10 events need to be lowered. The hours need to be earlier than midnight.
- Mr. Wood stated let's table the amendment for now and revise
